

Zoom Into the General Meeting

With the continuing restrictions on indoor gatherings by Alberta Health Services, the Executive of Local 38 has made the decision to cancel in-person meetings for December.

The December 21, 2021 Regular Membership meeting will be held through an on-line Zoom meeting. We encourage every *card-carrying member* to contact the office for the specific details to attend the meeting.

In an attempt to balance the confidentiality of the meeting with access for our members, we are asking the following:

- Contact the Union Office at 403-233-2700 or <u>of-fice@cupe38.org</u> to obtain the access code for the meeting.
- 2. When entering the Zoom meeting, please ensure your camera is on and that you identify yourself. We will need to confirm and record the name of all attendees. If a participant cannot be identified, they will be removed from the meeting.
- 3. Once the meeting starts, attendees will be given the instruction to turn off their camera if they desire to improve bandwidth.
- 4. If speaking, please activate your camera so other delegates can see who is speaking.

I want to thank everyone for their understanding during these times. While we prefer in-person meetings, to ensure the health and safety of our members, online meetings are needed to continue the democratic operations of our Local.



Mandatory Testing - Change in Policy

On December 1st, Local 38 was notified that the City of Calgary amended their Vaccination Policy to allow for the use of free rapid test kits for City staff over the next several months. This amendment was a direct result of the Calgary Police Service announcing their decision to provide free kits to sworn and civilian CPS staff.

Back in September, the City obtained a large quantity of free rapid test kits. The stated intention was to offer free test kits for the month of November only. Starting in December, any employee who was in the rapid test stream would be required to test twice weekly on their own time and at their own cost. The remaining stockpile of test kits would be provided only to those that had a legitimate exemption under the Alberta Human Rights Code.

On December 1st, the City met with the various Unions and explained that due to the CPS decision, the City did not want to be in a position of having two differing policies on the same issue. They also reviewed the number of test kits still in stock compared to the number of employees in the testing stream. The inventory of kits was such that the City believes they will be able to provide free test kits into February 2022. After the stock of free kits is depleted, the City will revert to their original position that employees must test at their own cost.

It is important to note that this decision will not cost Calgarians any money. The City obtained free kits in September from Alberta Health Services. The City did not use any internal budget for this acquisition.

Second, it is also important to note that the test kits have an expiry date. It made little sense to keep test kits in reserve only to have them expire.

The City Unions continue to have discussions with the City. The City has emphasized that the Vaccination Policy is likely to remain in effect for 2022, and possibly into 2023.

They require their member businesses to agree to sign a charter that lists commitment to environmental stewardship, inclusion, community prosperity, and relationship building as part of their focused goals, outside of just making money. In return, they provide tools and resources for marketing and workshops that provide training in everything from economics to diversity and waste reduction. For the consumer they provide a variety of products and services that you can feel good about supporting because this network of businesses put community first.

For provincially available local options, is chambermarket.ca. This website has gathered business owners and artisans from across Alberta in one online marketplace. You can get custom dog treats from Fort Saskatchewan to artisanal liquor made in Camrose using sugar beets grown in Taber, delivered right to your door in Calgary.
