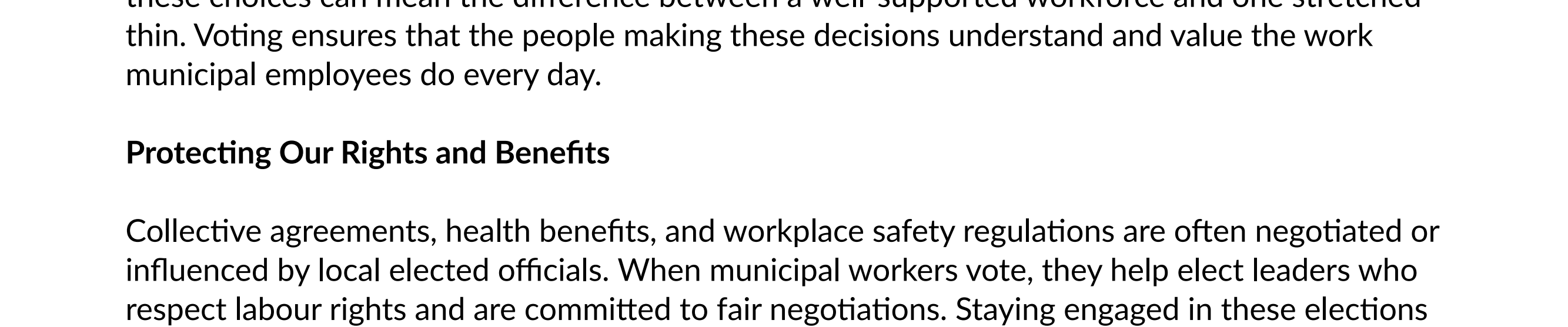

Municipal Elections 2025: Why Municipal Workers Must Vote



Municipal elections often fly under the radar, overshadowed by the drama and spectacle of national politics. Yet for municipal workers – those who serve Calgary in roles ranging from water services, waste water and public works to city planning, parks and open spaces, affordable housing and emergency services – these elections are not just important; they are foundational. The decisions made at the City Council directly shape our working conditions, job security, and the quality of life in the city we serve.

Voting in municipal elections is not only a civic duty—it's a strategic act of self-advocacy.

Local Decisions, Immediate Impact

Municipal governments control budgets, policies, and priorities that affect everything from staffing levels to equipment upgrades. Elected officials decide whether to invest in infrastructure, expand public services, or privatize essential functions. For municipal workers, these choices can mean the difference between a well-supported workforce and one stretched thin. Voting ensures that the people making these decisions understand and value the work municipal employees do every day.

Protecting Our Rights and Benefits

Building a City That Works for Everyone

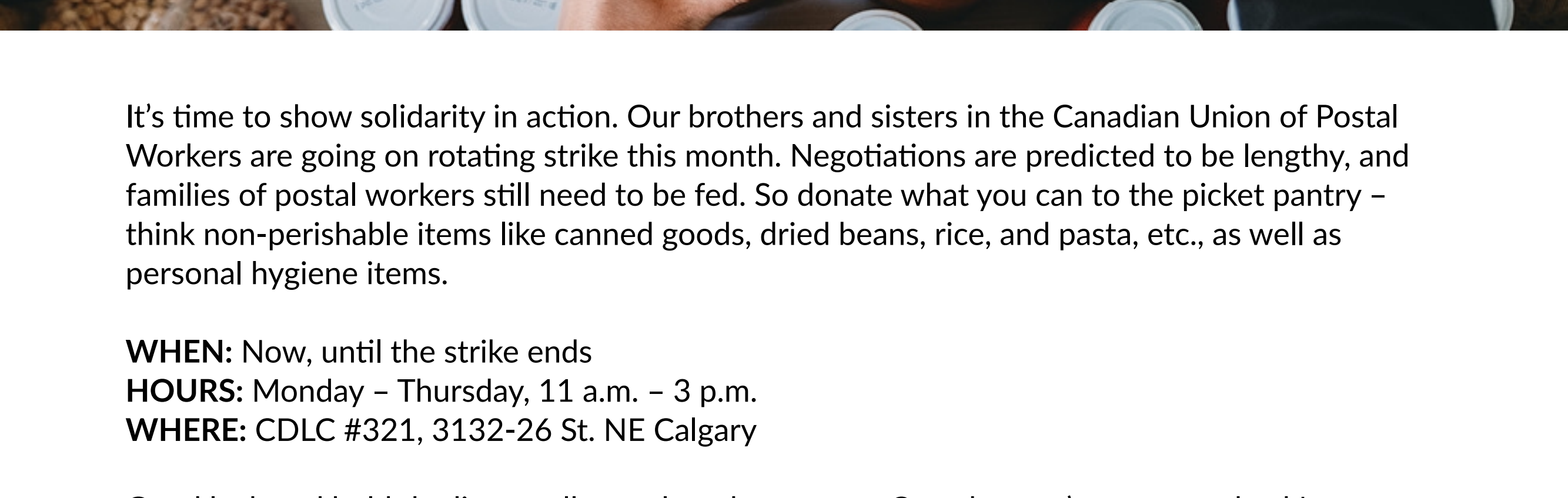

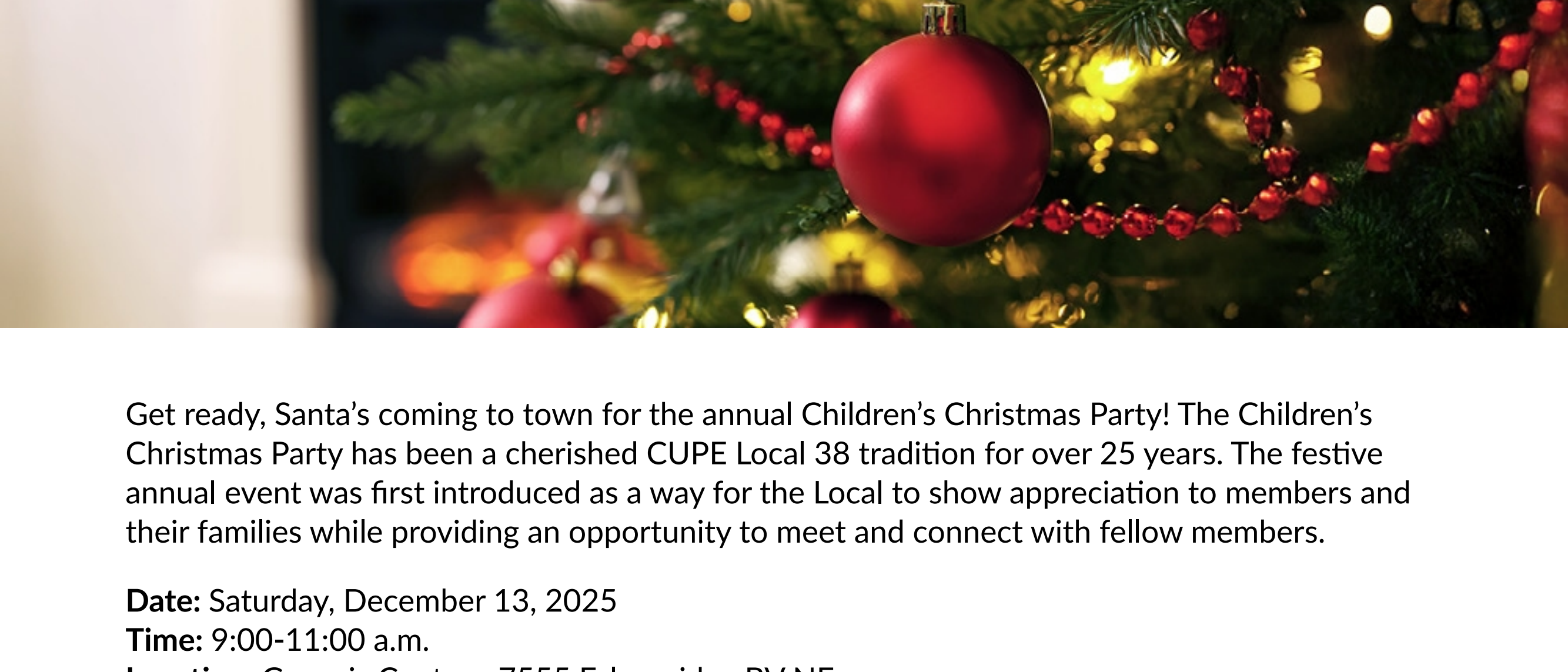

Candidate nomination and voting will be held at the upcoming monthly meeting, being held on October 28 at 7:00 p.m. via Zoom. See you there.

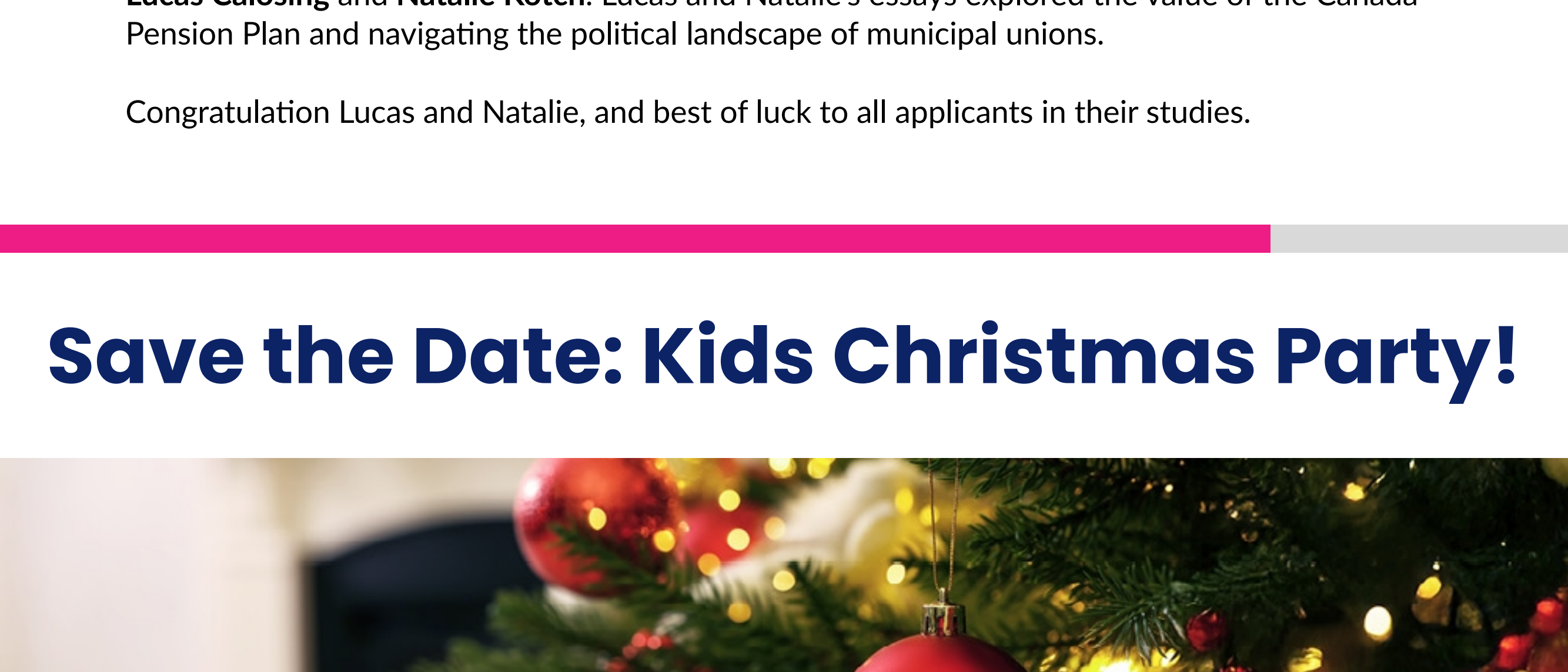
Support the Canadian Union of Postal Workers with Picket Pantry
